

Making a difference in Tanzania: Volunteer Placement Information

Following your climb you will undertake one of two 5-day volunteer placements around the Moshi area. Please find below some information about what these placements might involve.

Mkombozi

Mkombozi (meaning "liberator" or "emancipator" in Swahili) is the leading child-focused agency in Tanzania's Kilimanjaro and Arusha regions, using education, research, advocacy, and outreach to help vulnerable children and youth to grow in mind, body and spirit. These are some of the ways that Mkombozi tackles the complex issues surrounding child vulnerability:

- Researching and addressing the root causes that drive children to come to the streets;
- Enabling communities to value and protect vulnerable children;
- Offering education and work opportunities to each individual child
- Strengthening family-based care of children who live / work on the streets and HIV orphans;
- Offering safety, love, food and medical care for children and youth at a residential centre;
- Working with children who live / work on the streets to break cycles of dysfunction, to build problem-solving skills, to facilitate conflict-management, and to teach life skills;
- Fostering a popular movement to prioritise children and young people.

During your placement with Mkombozi, you will learn about the harsh reality of Tanzania's streets and be involved in the daily activities of the charity. There is the opportunity to tailor the placement to your own interests/skill including: *creative arts, medical skill, street outreach, and leading Christian fellowship*. Only a limited number of placements are available with Mkombozi.

Hotel accommodation will be provided close to one of Mkombozi's centres.
£250 of the money you raise will be donated to Mkombozi to support their work.



Community placement



Uru North is a of 4 villages (Njari, Ongoma, Mrawi and Msuni) in the Uru area of Moshi rural (about 30 minutes drive from Moshi town). Most of the 30,000 or so villagers in this area are subsistence farmers who sell any excess produce at the local market. The community benefits from a tiny amount of tourism revenue, as well as limited employment at nearby coffee estates. The villages often work together, pooling resources and skills to improve the lives of all – a great example of how communities in rural Tanzania can be proactive in working together to address common problems.

Your placement will see you working within the local community on a renovation/refurbishment focused project around the district. The costs of your placement including materials and any local labour required for your project will be paid for with a proportion of the money you raise. As far as possible all materials, food etc will be sourced from the community in which you work.

Supported by Really Wild Travel, you will be camping and living within the community which will give you a thorough immersion into the Tanzanian lifestyle and culture.
